

## VICAR'S LETTER □ SEPTEMBER 2016

Dear All

I hope all of you have had a good summer and are ready for the joys of Autumn

The hope topic in the Diocese is *Re-imagining Ministry*. How is the church going to deal with the shortage of full time, stipendiary clergy that is predicted in 10 years. It has already led to much discussion as parishes and deaneries work out how you keep the same number of churches going with less clergy. More and more responsibility will fall on the shoulders of Self Supporting Ministers (SSM) and ordained local Ministers (OLM) licensed laity, church wardens and congregations to keep parishes alive.

So SSM's do and will have an important role to play in the church. As the name suggests they are not given an stipend and usually support themselves through work and other means. What they offer can also vary. Some offer Sunday mornings others may offer 1 Sunday a month because of work and family commitments. Others offer Sunday's and 2/3 evenings and others 2/3 days. Just because they are not seen in church every Sunday, or evening does not mean they are not being a transforming presence in their work communities. It is important that we remember we are just a small of the community. There are more people outside the church who are not being given opportunities to experience the grace and love of God.

So it's important we realise that we may not see Hayley and Sue as often as we may expect but we need to remember that there ministry includes the secular roles they employ at work, even though they may not be with us in body they will be constantly praying for St Andrew's just as we will be praying for them

Let us all pray that we draw closer to God and that he gives us the strength to be a transforming presence in our own special communities and in our own special way.



# Bishop Stephen pays tribute to the late Bishop John Ball

ACNS, by Gavin Drake] The former general secretary of the Anglican mission agency Crosslinks, Bishop John Ball, has died at the age of 81 after a period of illness, his family have announced. During his ministry, John Ball served as the assistant bishop of the Diocese of Central Tanganyika, part of the Anglican Church of Tanzania; and upon his retirement served as an honorary assistant bishop in the Church of England's Diocese of Chelmsford.

Bishop John saw his task as a missionary of “working himself out of a job” by creating a scenario where his work could be taken over by an indigenous African, his family said. This he achieved in his first missionary post, as a youth worker in Eldoret, in Kenya’s Diocese of Nakuru; and in subsequent posts, including the manager of the Province of Kenya press and at the parish of Karen in Nairobi, where he was the last white vicar.

His time as the vicar of St Matthew’s Church in Eldoret, was “the first time we black people had been allowed in the vicarage here” a local resident told him when he returned for a visit 30-years-later. “Of course John would never have expected them not to come in,” his family said. “They were his brothers and sisters and the people God had called him to love.”

Bishop John was responsible for transforming the former Bible Churchmen's Missionary Society to Crosslinks, in recognition that all people were valued and loved by God. "He believed that our Christian brothers and sisters from other cultures were able to be partners in mission just as effectively and sometimes more so than we from the white west," his family said.

His desire to bring people within the Good news of Christ's love for them . . . drove him, often it seemed, to do three jobs at a time he worked so hard and give himself in so many ways to so many people," they said.

The current mission director of Crosslinks, the Revd Canon Andy Lines, said that he regularly turns to Bishop John's hand-over notes even though "I was not the one he was handing over to!"

He said that he was "still discovering ways, policies and processes that were put in place during John Ball's tenure as general secretary, now more than twenty years ago.

"John and [his widow] Anne's influence on the society has been massive and he established relationships in the UK, Ireland and around the world that I have benefitted hugely from. I will miss his wisdom and support but will continue to benefit from the fruit of his service to his Lord."

His family said that "John would never have imagined himself becoming a bishop and the suggestion of going back to Africa and taking a job which an African could have done we believed vexed him. But he was willing to listen to God's call and to realise that the post of assistant bishop in the Diocese of Central Tanganyika was one where he could serve out his working life effectively and well in a way which enabled the African Church and African Christians to grow in their faith and love for God."

The Vicar General of the Diocese of Central Tanganyika, the Revd Canon George Chomolla, paid tribute to Bishop John. "As a diocese we remember the extra-ordinary ministry of Baba and Mama Ball during their life in the diocese. . . their many visits and confirmation safaris. We feel humbled by their service."

Upon his retirement in 2000, he served the Diocese of Chelmsford in a voluntary capacity; both as an honorary assistant bishop in the diocese and as a preacher at the city's Holy Trinity Church. Plans are still being made for his funeral, which will be held at Holy Trinity.


# Elie Wiesel

## EARLY LIFE

Elie Wiesel was born in Sighet (now Sighetu Marmăției), Maramureș in the Carpathian Mountains in Romania. His parents were Sarah Feig and Shlomo Wiesel. At home, Wiesel's family spoke Yiddish most of the time, but also German, Hungarian, and Romanian. Wiesel's mother, Sarah, was the daughter of Dodye Feig, a celebrated

Vizhnitz Hasid and farmer from a nearby village. Dodye was active and trusted within the community.

Wiesel's father, Shlomo, instilled a strong sense of humanism in his son, encouraging him to learn Hebrew and to read literature, whereas his mother encouraged him to study the Torah. Wiesel has said his father represented reason while his mother Sarah promoted faith.

Wiesel had three siblings – older sisters Beatrice and Hilda, and younger sister Tzipora. Beatrice and Hilda survived the war and were reunited with Wiesel at a French orphanage. They eventually emigrated to North America, with Beatrice moving to Montreal, Quebec, Canada. Tzipora, Shlomo, and Sarah did not survive the Holocaust.

## IMPRISONED AND ORPHANED DURING THE

## HOLOCAUST

In March 1944, Germany occupied Hungary which extended the Holocaust into that country. Wiesel was 15, and he with his family, along with the rest of the town's Jewish population, were placed in one of the two confinement ghettos set up in Máramarossziget (Sighet), the town where he had been born and raised. In May 1944, the Hungarian authorities, under German pressure, began to deport the Jewish community to the Auschwitz concentration camp, where up to 90% of the people were exterminated on arrival.

After they were sent to Auschwitz, his mother and his younger sister were killed.<sup>[14]</sup> Wiesel and his father were later deported to the concentration camp at Buchenwald. Until that transfer, he admitted to Oprah Winfrey, his primary motivation for trying to survive Auschwitz was knowing that his father was still alive: "I knew that if I died, he would die." After they were taken to Buchenwald, however, his father only survived for eight months, dying just a few weeks before the camp was liberated. In *Night*, Wiesel recalled the shame he felt when he heard his father being beaten and was unable to help.

Wiesel was tattooed with inmate number "A-7713" on his left arm. The camp was liberated by the U.S. Third Army on April 11, 1945

# *Prayer*

## *At the Centre of our Christian life*

Well that is the theory – but how much time really do you or give to prayer. Prayer comes in many shapes and sizes but can be divided into two forms:- individual or corporate prayer. Both forms are important and necessary for any Christian and both help each of us to communicate with God and grow in faith.

If prayer is so important why do we find it so hard to do? Have you noticed that as soon as you sit down to prayer thoughts seem to cascade into your mind- shopping lists needed be completed, phone calls to be made, worries that sneak in and distract. Then even you get those all you do is talk an endless list of requests because is interested in very part of your life.

Where is the time to communicate with God? To stop and listen because let me tell you the God of the universe wants to talk and spend time with you. Sometimes we find it easier if we are with others because we have all come together with a willingness to grow deeper in our relationship with God. We are able to support, encourage and praise together, there a certain amount of accountability when we pray collectively.

My prayer for St Andrew's is that all of us grow deeper in our knowledge and love of God. That praying becomes as important as eating and has natural as breathing. So I would encourage you to join us at our regular prayer sessions and you will be surprised to see how many there are.



## **How heavy is your pebble? How about your Cross?**

At Septembers All-Age service, Marie Preached on Luke 14:25 -34 the cost of being a disciple.

We were asked to think about how much things cost for us to do, the example given was to learn an instrument. Having a good think together, we came up with things like equipment, lessons, travel, time, sacrifice and dedication we felt were all things that would have to be dealt with in order to progress.

Marie then asked us to then think about the cost of being a disciple. We may lose friends. We may feel scared. We may become separated from those we love. We may even be in dangerous situations, maybe even life threatening. We may have to make difficult choices. Is that what Jesus means when he says

**<sup>27</sup> And whoever does not carry their cross and follow me cannot be my disciple**

But the passage then goes on to say

**<sup>28</sup> "Suppose one of you wants to build a tower. Won't you first sit down and estimate the cost to see if you have enough money to complete it?"<sup>29</sup> For if you lay the foundation and are not able to finish it, everyone who sees it will ridicule you,<sup>30</sup> saying, 'This person began to build and wasn't able to finish.'**

So, we must think it through. What are the benefits and costs of truly following Jesus? Both can be great, but a life with Jesus Christ is the prize. That is surely the best thing to gain! Do you still have your pebble? Keep it handy as a reminder!
